McRel offers national standards on several content areas, including: art connections, dance, music, theatre, visual arts, behavioral studies, civics, economics, foreign language, geography, health, U.S. history, world history, language arts, life work, mathematics, physical education, science, and technology.

The goals for school science that underlie the *National Science Education Standards* are to educate students who are able to:

- experience the richness and excitement of knowing about and understanding the natural world;
- use appropriate scientific processes and principles in making personal decisions;
- engage intelligently in public discourse and debate about matters of scientific and technological concern; and
- increase their economic productivity through the use of the knowledge, understanding, and skills of a scientifically literate person in their careers.
